From this verse, what do we learn about the source and outcome of joy?

How does your joy impact your outlook on your circumstances? Your attitudes? Your interactions with others? Is there anything that needs to change?



Where is your heart currently? If it needs redirection, list out what you can find joy in today. If you are currently joyful, share what you are finding joy in with someone else today! It might help change their heart, attitudes, and perspective too!
